KORORO PUBLIC SCHOOL



RATIONALE

Public schools are inclusive environments, where diversity is affirmed and individual differences are respected. Schools exist in a society where intimidation and harassment occur. Bullying must be taken seriously and is not acceptable in any form. Students have the right to expect that they will spend the school day free from the fear of bullying, harassment and intimidation.

Bullying:

- devalues, isolates and frightens
- affects an individual's ability to achieve
- has long-term effects on those engaging in bullying behaviour, those who are the subjects of bullying behaviour and the onlookers or bystanders.

Teachers, students, parents, caregivers and members of the wider community have a responsibility to work together to address bullying.

DEFINITION OF BULLYING

Bullying can be defined as intentional, repeated behaviour by an individual or group of individuals that causes distress, hurt or undue pressure. Bullying involves the abuse of power in relationships. Bullying can involve all forms of harassment (including sex, race, disability, homosexuality or transgender), humiliation, domination and intimidation of others.

Bullying behaviour can be:

- verbal eg name calling, teasing, abuse, putdowns, sarcasm, insults, threats
- **physical** eg hitting, punching, kicking, scratching, tripping, spitting
- social eg ignoring, excluding, ostracising, alienating, making inappropriate gestures
- **psychological** eg spreading rumours, dirty looks, hiding or damaging possessions, malicious SMS and email messages, inappropriate use of camera phones.



ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

Students, teachers, parents, caregivers and members of the wider school community have a responsibility to:

- promote positive relationships that respect and accept individual differences and diversity within the whole school community
- contribute to the development of the Anti-bullying Plan and support it through words and actions
- actively work together to resolve incidents of bullying behaviour when they occur
- build resilience in students to deal with difficult or challenging situations.

Students can expect to:

- know that their concerns will be responded to by school staff
- be provided with appropriate support (for both the subjects of and those responsible for the behaviour)
- take part in learning experiences that address key understandings and skills relating to positive relationships, safety, gender equity, discrimination, bullying and harassment. These experiences will be guided by the Personal Development, Health and Physical Education syllabuses and other Key Learning Areas.

Students have a responsibility to:

- behave appropriately, respecting individual differences and diversity
- follow the school Anti-bullying Plan
- respond to incidents of bullying according to the school Anti-bullying Plan.

Parents and caregivers have a responsibility to:

- support their children in all aspects of their learning
- be aware of the school Anti-bullying Plan and assist their children in understanding bullying behaviour
- support their children in developing positive responses to incidents of bullying consistent with the school Anti-bullying Plan
- support all students of the school to deal effectively with bullying through the strategies of the Anti-bullying Plan.

Teachers have a responsibility to:

- respect and support students in all aspects of their learning
- model appropriate behaviour
- respond in an appropriate and timely manner to incidents of bullying according to the school Anti-bullying Plan.

The Principal and Executives have a responsibility to:

- lead the development, implementation and evaluation of the Anti-bullying Plan
- ensure the plan is readily accessible to all members of the school community.

PROCEDURES AND PLANS

Identifying	By students:
bullying	 Understand the definition of bullying as intentional, repeated behaviour by an individual or group of individuals that causes distress, hurt or undue pressure. It is not an isolated incident.
	 Learn about bullying by participating in learning experiences in class, at assemblies etc. Be assertive in saying "Stop it, I don't like it, go away" to anyone who
	demonstrates behaviours that are hurtful, offensive or insulting. By parent and caregivers
	 Be aware of all forms of bullying by reading information in this policy and newsletters.
	Assist their children in understanding bullying behaviour.
	 By teachers Teach students key understandings and skills relating to positive relationships, safety, gender equity, discrimination, bullying and harassment. These experiences will be guided by the Personal Development, Health and Physical Education syllabuses and other Key Learning Areas. Formally teach 'The Five Point Plan' to students in their class each year. Be aware of all forms of bullying.
	• Be alert and observant for acts of bullying in class, playground etc.
	 By Principal and Executive Inform students, teachers, parents and caregivers about strategies to be assertive in preventing bullying, and to identify and report bullying.
Reporting	By students
Reporting	 Report acts of bullying (towards themselves or others) to class teacher or duty teacher, Executive or Principal.
	By parents and caregivers
	 Notify a teacher, Executive or Principal of acts of bullying that were reported or witnessed.
	 By teachers Notify the Executive or Principal of acts of bullying that were reported or witnessed.



Intervening	Students
	• Students who have bullied other students will be dealt with according to the KPS Achievement and Behaviour Policy.
	 Students who have been bullied will be provided with support and reminded of appropriate strategies to protect themselves from bullying. Referral to the School Counsellor will be made if deemed appropriate.
	Parents and caregivers
	 Parents of students who have bullied will be informed according to the KPS Achievement and Behaviour Policy.
	• Parents of students who have been bullied will be informed.
	By teachers and other school staff
	 Implement the KPS Achievement and Behaviour Policy in response to bullying.
	 Regularly discuss with teachers, at Communication Meetings and Learning Support Team Meetings, any student/s of concern, and plans to prevent and deal with particular instances of bullying.
	Reinforce the 'Five Point Plan' to students

support	• Access support of parents, teachers, Executive, Principal or School Counsellor. Speak up about concerns, as with protective behaviours.

	 Access support by making an appointment to speak with the teacher, Executive, Principal or School Counsellor.
